DEATH NOTICES:

I regret to inform you of the death of ex-SAC John Docker who passed away on Thursday 1st October 2009. John who was born on 30th October 1933, would have been seventy-six on 30th October. John joined the Birmingham Branch in March 1991 and has been a stalwart member of the Branch ever since and had also served us well as our Branch Standard Bearer. John had been ill for some time and he will now be sadly missed.

John enlisted on 10th January 1952 and after his Regiment Training at RAF Dumfries and Driver Training at RAF Weeton, was posted to a Rifle Squadron (No unknown) at RAF Credenhill and served there and at RAF Thornaby with that squadron until he was posted to 58 Field Squadron at RAF Khormaksar at Aden and later at RAF Eastleigh, Kenya. During his service there he was detached to 1340 Flight at Marrians Farm on anti-terrorist patrols. John completed his service there and was discharged on 31st December 1954. He was awarded the General Service Medal Kenya Clasp and the Queen's Coronation Medal.

He is survived by his wife Eileen to whom we extend our sincere condolences. At the time of this newsletter being posted off for photocopying, no funeral details were available.

Our Branch Vice-President Dave Gooding of whom more later, Roy Thomas and W/O Mick Silver, now, due to his retirement from the Regiment, Mr. Silver. Due to Roy and Mick's shift working arrangements, Dave will take the lead role assisted by Roy and Mick where their shift patterns allow.

RAF Regiment Memorial Project 2009

At last month's Branch meeting we agreed to donate £500.00 to this important project that will greatly enhance the appearance of the RAF Regiment Memorial Garden. The project will cost about £3,800 to complete and the RAF Regiment Secretary Martin Hooker has told me that with our donation, he now has about £2,900 so we're getting there. When the Birmingham

Branch installed the current grey paving slabs, the one hundred and ninety 2 X 2 foot slabs cost £363.97. Digging out the foundations for the slabs by the NMA staff cost £370.00 and the slabs were laid by a professional slab layer at a cost of £400.00, making a total of £1,333.97. This was funded by a donation from the RAF Regiment Association of £500.00 and £733.97 taken from the remaining balance transferred from the Memorial Garden Appeal Fund.

At the time this was all we could afford but the red paving bricks it is proposed to install in their place will look very much better and will give a much more modern appearance, much more in keeping with the general appearance of the NMA. I'm sure that the remaining £900.00 of the money required will be raised and that we will soon be able to greatly enhance the appearance of the RAF Regiment Memorial Garden.

Major Coup for the RAF Regiment

In my August newsletter on page 6, I told you about a major development for the RAF Regiment by the formation of a new Field Squadron and a new Force Protection Wing Headquarters. The RAF Regiment has become so strategically important that in July, the Armed Forces Minister announced that a new Force Protection Wing Headquarters and a new Field Squadron would be operational by this month. The twelve personnel needed to run the FP Wing HQ and the one hundred and seventy-two troops to man the new Field Squadron will deploy to Afghanistan in 2011. And a MoD study has determined that the best possible base for this new Wing and Squadron will be either RAF Leuchars in Scotland or RAF Shawbury in Shropshire. I think that the best location would be Shawbury not only from our point of view but mainly for the excellent recruiting possibilities in the Midlands.

Battle of Crete 1941

As the following article "Who Watches the Watchers" will tell you, the Battle of Crete was a major factor in the establishment of the RAF Regiment but what was it all about? On the morning of 20th May, 1941, the Germans launched the first airborne invasion in history. And they chose the Greek island of Crete in the Eastern Mediterranean for it.

The Battle of Crete was unprecedented in three respects: it was the first mainly airborne invasion; it was the first time the Allies made significant use of intelligence from the deciphered

German Enigma code; and it was the first time invading German troops encountered mass resistance from a civilian population. In addition, as a result of the heavy casualties suffered by the parachutists, Adolf Hitler forbade further large scale airborne operations. However, the Allies were impressed by the potential of paratroopers and started to build their own airborne divisions. The battle began on the morning of 20th May 1941, when Nazi Germany launched an airborne invasion of Crete under the code-name “Unternehmen Merkur” (“Operation Mercury”) Greek and Allied forces together with Cretan civilians defended the island.

After one day of fighting, the Germans had suffered appalling casualties and none of their objectives had been achieved. The next day though, through bad communications and the failure of Allied commanders to grasp the situation, Maleme airfield in western Crete fell to the Germans, enabling them to fly in reinforcements and overwhelm the Allied forces. The ensuing battle lasted for about ten days. Aircraft, and the personnel, facilities and equipment necessary to maintain and operate them, are particularly vulnerable to attack on the ground. The RAF discovered this to its cost during the Battle of Crete when German airborne forces quickly overran the lightly defended airfields. The realization that air assets required their own robust defences led to the formation of the RAF Regiment in 1942. To my great pleasure and surprise, the Mail Online Live has recognised the importance of the RAF Regiment role by publishing on 5th September 2009, the following major article about this development. With my apologies to Jeremy Taylor I have rearranged some of the paragraphs as he has used what I call “flashbacks” which slightly confused me and may confuse some of my readers.

Who Watches the Watchers?

The RAF's fighters and spotter 'planes rule the skies in Afghanistan but they are terribly vulnerable on the ground – which is why the RAF has ordered a new unit to protect them.

It was a major coup for the RAF Regiment and virtually unprecedented in military circles where more commonly numbers are being cut or regiments amalgamated to save money.

However, the Taliban have become so aggressive that the Regiment's Force Protection Wings have become key to containing the threat against British air bases. Most people imagine it's the Army who protect our airfields in hostile environments and that members of the RAF just fly and maintain the aircraft. In fact RAF Regiment Force Protection Wings are responsible for protecting both the military airport in Kandahar, where British forces are based in Afghanistan, and since July, the desert airbase at Camp Bastion.

The Royal Air Force has become the backbone of the military operation in Afghanistan and it is vital that the two air bases are protected from constant attacks.

Out of defeat – the rise of a new RAF Regiment

Force Protection Wings have their origins in the 1920's when No 1 Armoured Car Company RAF was deployed in Rolls-Royce armoured vehicles across the Middle East, including Iraq. Fitted with a turret and a machine gun, the mobile teams proved successful in helping to prevent attacks on vulnerable outposts. However, it took the military disaster at the Battle of Crete in 1941 to persuade Whitehall defence chiefs that a dedicated RAF Regiment was needed to protect Royal Air force assets in the far-flung corners of the world. Allied forces stationed on the Greek island were defeated after a bloody battle that claimed more than 10,000 lives in just ten days. Poor leadership and communications were blamed for the defeat but a key factor was the loss of the airfield at Maleme, which enabled the Germans to fly in reinforcements. Within a year the RAF Regiment was formed, thanks to a Royal Warrant signed by King George VI.

At the height of World War Two its numbers swelled to more than 85,000 men, with paratroopers, field squadrons, armoured cars and mortar teams – just a few of the specialist units set up to defend air bases. Regiment numbers fell significantly during peacetime and the term Force Protection Wing didn't come into existence until 2004. Before that, they were known by the less memorable title of Tactical Survive to Operate Headquarters (Tac STO HQ).

My mission is to reach the perimeter wire. There's an open road between myself and the fence, with nothing obvious blocking my path. Sitting behind the steering wheel, I use a pair of binoculars for a final check. The coast seems clear, and my family hatchback doesn't look out of place in this remote Norfolk backwater. But inside my vehicle, hidden is the spare wheel foot well, is an AK 47 Assault Rifle. I'm at the Stanford Training Area (STANTA) near Thetford, which is used by around 85,000 members of Britain's Armed Forces, on a training exercise with a RAF Force Protection Wing. I'm posing as a would-be terrorist and the fence is playing the role of the outer barrier of an airbase.

The area is littered with pretend battlegrounds and shot-up buildings, as well as firing ranges and tank tracks. Perhaps the most bizarre feature of the site is the purpose-built Afghan village. It is surrounded by high walls painted a sand colour, inside, it's a labyrinth of narrow streets and alleys – complete with Afghan graffiti – all designed to prepare troops for the dangers they will encounter in Afghanistan. Today the exercise is taking place in open country. So far I haven't seen an armoured vehicle or even a single person. The occasional helicopter hovering overhead is the only reminder that this is no ordinary Norfolk road. As I drive over a small ridge, I mentally measure out the final half mile.

I am doing well. I'm just a few hundred yards from celebrating my success when I round a corner and come face-to-face with a weapons mounted installation kit (WMIK) – essentially an armoured Land Rover. The vehicle looks sinister enough but it's also loaded in the rear with a 12.7 heavy machine gun, an upgraded version of the Browning M2 50 cal. Weighing in at a hefty 80lb it is capable of taking out a low-flying aircraft.

I hit the brake pedal hard. Then I notice the ground around me moving as men camouflaged with grass, branches and soil, suddenly appear. There's nowhere to hide, nowhere to make a break as more and more human bushes appear in every direction. This is my first, slightly uncomfortable contact with the RAF Force Protection Wing, although they've obviously been watching me for some time.

My captors in Norfolk are from 51 Squadron RAF Regiment, part of No 5 Force Protection Wing. They are multitasking soldiers,

or Gunners in RAF "speak". They are on a patrol exercise and loaded with more hand luggage than most of us would take on a two-week holiday.

After I'm invited to open the bonnet, doors and tailgate of my car, one Gunner carries out a meticulous search of every nook and cranny. It takes them minutes to find my rifle stashed under the boot floor. As I am led away for questioning, a few of the men are at the roadside, preparing their camouflage gear for another operation. The webbing blankets draped over their shoulders are covered in green and brown stands, with tufts of long grass sprouting from their helmets. One of them is using a compact mirror to smear on thick grease. Moments after I've been led away I turn round and the unit is gone. They've vanished into thin air, gone to ground a few yards from where I am now. And that's the thing about this RAF Regiment. They operate quietly below the radar, providing a vital but little-known role.

Vehicle Check Points (VCPs) are an essential part of the defence strategy in Afghanistan.

"VCPs like this are carried out every day", says Wing Commander Derek Read OC No5 Force Protection Wing. They provide a visible presence on the ground, help prevent the movement of weaponry by the Taliban and act as a deterrent to those who might try to do so. We also guard the approaches to runways to deny the enemy the chance to launch ground-to-air rocket attacks".

Squadron Leader Al Green tells me; First and foremost the unit is guarding the aircraft that are taking off and landing, protecting them from Taliban forces looking to shoot them down. They protect the airbases from indirect fire, such as mortars, rockets and small-arms fire directed into the base itself". Training is tough and there is a significant rate of failure. But the members of the unit need to know how to fight too, as they can get caught up in action. Among those who have already made the grade is Corporal David Hayden from Spalding who, in 2008, became the first Airman to be awarded a Military Cross, after braving a hail of enemy bullets to rescue a fatally wounded colleague at Al-Waki, near Basrah. Corporal Hayden's foot patrol had been ambushed and pinned down by up to fifty insurgents.

Speaking from his base in Afghanistan, Corporal Hayden said; "There was effective fire coming at us from all sides, at least a dozen firing points. But we were giving as good as we were

getting and picked off quite a few gunmen and they exposed themselves to fire. I'm certainly no hero – I was just doing my job”.

The best of the best on the ground

“Our men are among the best of the best on the ground” says Wing Commander Read. We need people who are tough and robust but they have to be intelligent enough to understand a wide range of complex kit. They could be using a powerful Nikon camera for surveillance, the latest computerised communication equipment or new Javelin Anti-Tank missiles”. Wing Commander Read, who in the past has served in hotspots like Kuwait and Sierra Leone, says the multiple roles expected of the RAF Regiment meant it constantly needed to update and improve equipment. “When I joined in the eighties, we were armed to defend our bases from more conventional Soviet attacks during the Cold War. Now we are operating in places where the enemy is difficult to identify, often using improvised explosive devices or even suicide attacks. Our equipment lists reflect this situation. We are a relatively small force with a protective role and that means we have to multitask. We might need a camera or night-vision equipment to carry out surveillance, or specialist sniper rifles and 250 cc quad bikes to move them around quickly”.

In Afghanistan

In Afghanistan units often spend days out in the field, the men carrying up to 120lb of equipment as they mount surveillance and sniper exercises, or make random vehicle checks around the air bases. The RAF is cagey about exact numbers but fifty to one hundred men are on duty outside the protection of the perimeter at any one time. It might sound a lot but their patrol area can extend to hundreds of square miles.

It's dangerous work. In the course of their patrols, three members of the RAF Regiment have been killed by roadside bombs or mines since August 2001. A further four died during six years of safeguarding the RAF airfield at Basrah International Airport in Iraq. Shifts are long, often between twelve and sixteen hours. The heat means they have to carry over eight litres of water as well as all their equipment.

It's 50 degrees centigrade and sweat is dripping down his forehead and into his eyes. He rubs it away, leaving a dark smudge of desert dust. He scans the area and then picks up his telescopic sight to get a better view. His body is

aching badly. He's been in this 6 foot by 6 foot hole for two days and he is starting to get cramp.

But with the roof barely an inch above his head, there isn't even room to stretch his arms. And he has to share this tiny space with a “spotter”, the man he's here to protect. Corporal Toby Box aged thirty from London, is a sniper with the RAF Regiment's Force Protection Wing. He spends days out in the field in Afghanistan, usually dug into a small hole from where the spotter relays intelligence back to Kandahar Air Base. Once in place, the two men are unable to break cover, cook food or move more than a few feet inside their cocoon. Corporal Box and his spotter dig out their hole under cover of darkness and it's always filled in at the end of a mission. They use folding shovels that they have carried in their kit together with all the equipment they need; a high-powered Nikon camera, telescopic sight, an Accuracy International L96A1 Sniper Rifle, rations and most importantly, litres of water.

A neat square is cut out in the scrubland and put aside. Then the serious digging begins. All the soil has to be carried away from the site in sacks or dragged on sheets to a spot where it doesn't give away the location of the observation point. Logs are then placed over the hole, followed by chicken wire and a plastic sheet. The topsoil and turf are then carefully replaced on top of the sheet. “The idea is that if somebody stood on top of a hole and dug down, they'd have to dig some way before they realised there were men underneath” says Box. In Afghanistan, the holes are left open where possible because it is so hot. The men will stay in the hole for up to five days, watching and observing.

They survive on cold rations because cooking would give away their location; a bottle of Tabasco sauce provides the only heat they're allowed. Washing and cleaning teeth is not an option as soap and toothpaste can be smelled from three hundred feet away. Holed up in his dugout, Corporal Box is carefully scanning for anything suspicious – a vehicle could be carrying weapons or a group of Taliban preparing to make an assault on the airbase. Rocket attacks can be launched from up to twelve miles away and are a frequent occurrence.

Often the Taliban fire a barrage of up to twenty at a time from makeshift launch sites, and it is the job of the RAF Regiment to be alert to the

potential threat. The protection provided by the Force Protection Wings is regarded by many as the best in the military. Up to three hundred members of the RAF Regiment are currently serving in Afghanistan, and the two airbases are guarded around the clock.

NATIONAL MEMORIAL ARBORETUM (NMA) UPDATE

For anyone who has not visited the National Memorial Arboretum recently, it is constantly changing with new memorials being frequently added. With this in mind, for any of you considering visiting, if you do, it will be well worthwhile investing a fiver in buying the second edition of the NMA guide book for it is well worth having.

Not only is it very well laid out it is of enormous use in finding your way around the site and identifying all the memorials. You may think that all the memorials should be easy to identify and so they are but the guide book contains a wealth of other information about them. Not only that, a few of them consist of groups of trees and without the guide book, you would not know why they are there. So go on, splash out a fiver and you won't regret it, for not only will it be of great help in finding your way around, it is well worth having in its own right as a valuable source of reference.

Dedication of Memorial to Polish forces

On Saturday 19th September, at the National Memorial Arboretum in Staffordshire, UK, over 1,500 guests were present for the unveiling and dedication of the internationally significant Polish Armed Forces Memorial. Polish Armed Forces veterans from across the UK joined guests including HRH The Duke of Kent and Her Excellency Barbara Krystyna Tuge-Erecińska, Ambassador of the Republic of Poland and other senior figures from the UK and Polish governments and their armed forces.

The imposing bronze and granite Polish Armed Forces Memorial, situated prominently in a site that is fast becoming one of the world's leading places for remembrance, will signal to the last remaining veterans that their struggles, and those of their departed comrades, will be duly remembered for generations to come. The Polish Armed Forces Memorial is superbly located at the eastern end of 'The Beat' a long avenue of chestnut trees. Four humble toy soldiers, each painted a bronze colour and glued back-to-back

atop a two pence piece provided the inspiration behind the Memorial's design.

It was decided that the statue would be based on this model soldier concept and would comprise four sculptures of typical members of the different branches of the Polish Armed Forces: the Air Force, the Army, the Navy and the Polish Underground Home Army. The Airman is a Polish pilot from RAF 303 Squadron during the Battle of Britain; the Underground figure is a woman courier wearing civilian clothes; the Army is represented by a typical Polish soldier from the battle of Monte-Casino; the Sailor is a crew member of the Polish destroyer *Błyskawica*.

In addition, incorporated within the statue is the symbol of the Polish Eagle (the Polish State emblem), uniting all four sculptures under its outspread wings. The statue is set within an imposing 18 metre diameter architectural feature which has a series of inset plaques describing the Polish contribution in the Second World War.

The Memorial is designed to act not only as a tribute to the fallen, but also as an educational aid for those visitors not familiar with the history of the allied Polish Forces. Seventy years after the invasion of Poland, leading British statesmen and military leaders, from The Rt. Hon. the Baroness Thatcher to General The Lord Guthrie, unite to remind us: "We must never forget Poland's unique contribution to Britain's freedom and the defeat of Nazi Germany."

"First to Fight" a New Book

Polish veterans were profoundly shocked to find young people in the UK asking whether Poland fought with Germany in WW2. To ensure their contribution to Britain's war effort is remembered, a new book 'First to Fight' was launched on 1st September 2009, ahead of the dedication at the NMA of the first national memorial to Polish forces in the UK last month.

The Polish veterans' 'last campaign' is being supported vigorously by Britain's senior political and military establishment, including Baroness Thatcher, Patron Conservative Friends of Poland, who said:

"Today, as we mark the 70th anniversary of the invasion of Poland and the subsequent outbreak of World War II, we remember the unique contribution of the Polish armed forces towards the freedom of Britain, of Europe and indeed of the world. Poland fought alongside us from the first day of the war to the last. Her

people showed extraordinary bravery: many giving their lives as the ultimate sacrifice.

But the freedoms for which they fought were to be cruelly denied them in the post-war world. Those who remained in exile could only look on as a new wave of oppression engulfed their country. Some would never achieve their heart-felt goal of returning to their homeland. But, finally, after more than four decades under communist tyranny, the people of Poland were able to set their own destiny. In Britain, we remember the steadfastness of the Polish people; we treasure the bond of history which ties our peoples together; and we look forward to a flourishing friendship which will serve our nations well into the future."

General The Lord Guthrie, former Chief of the Defence Staff, writes in the book:

"We owe much to the Poles who came to join us in our struggle. There was a time when the only allies the British Commonwealth had were Polish and large numbers died in battle many miles from their country. We are right to remember those gallant men and women who, at a very difficult time in both our countries' histories, were our firm friends and allies."

'First to Fight' recounts Poland's epic six year struggle – with some historically significant texts being published for the first time, such as the English translation of Stalin's signed order to execute 14,736 of the Polish Officer Corps at Katyn Forest in 1940.

The story is brought to life with moving personal stories from Poles who fought in the air, on land and at sea, on many fronts. For example, the myth of Polish cavalry charging German Panzers is put to bed: yes they did charge, but to

good effect as recounted by Lieutenant Andrzej Zylinski. Leading the 4th Squadron of the Polish 11th Uhlan Regiment they charged with sabres drawn, breaching the German defences of Kałuszyn. After fierce fighting, the town was captured with the almost complete destruction of the German 44th Regiment, whose commander committed suicide.

'First to Fight' was launched ahead of the dedication of the first official war memorial in the UK for the 500,000 members of the Polish forces who fought in WW2 under British command. The event, in the presence of HRH The Duke of Kent, took place at the National Memorial Arboretum on 19th September. With the publication of 'First to Fight' and the unveiling of the Polish War Memorial last month, the last remaining veterans now know that their struggles, and those of their departed comrades, will be duly remembered in Britain for generations to come.

Historical Synopsis

Despite being the first to bear the brunt of Hitler's Blitzkrieg, Poland's resistance lasted longer than that of France, Norway, Holland or Belgium and was only hastened by the invasion from their rear by the Soviet Union. After the fall of Poland and France over half a million Poles found a way to answer Churchill's call to arms of "blood, sweat and tears" by continuing the fight under British command (many having to walk over 2,000 miles after being released from Stalin's Siberian gulags to do so). From the pilots of 303 Squadron, who shot down the highest tally of German aircraft in the Battle of Britain, to the men of General Anders 2nd Corps who captured Monte Casino.

EDITOR'S NOTE 1:

Shortly after the attack on the Soviet Union by Germany on June 22, 1941, Anders was released by the Soviets with the aim of forming a Polish Army to fight alongside the Red Army.

Continued friction with the Soviets over political issues as well as shortages of weapons, food and clothing led to the eventual exodus of Anders' men - known as the Anders Army - together with a sizeable contingent of Polish and Jewish civilians, along the Persian Corridor into Iran, Iraq and Palestine; where Anders formed and led the 2nd Polish Corps while agitating for the release of Polish nationals still in the Soviet Union.

It was during this time that large numbers of non-combat-capable Polish men and women were sent to Britain. Many stayed, and made their way in the world after the end of the war. Anders was the commander of the 2nd Polish Corps in Italy 1943–1946, capturing Monte Casino in the Battle of Monte Casino. Poles were also critical to cracking the German Ultra codes and providing intelligence on the V1 and V2 rocket programme threatening our population on the Home Front. More Poles died as a percentage of its population than any other country, but at the end of the War they saw their country lose its freedom to the Soviet Union who had conspired with Nazi Germany to invade Poland in September 1939. Over 120,000 Polish veterans settled in Britain after the war, unable to return home for threat of imprisonment or death at the hands of Stalin.

Whilst they assimilated well into British society and were grateful for the safe haven offered, their contribution to Britain's freedom seemed to be soon forgotten. When over 130 allied nations marched in the great 1946 Victory Parade in London, the Poles were excluded to appease 'Uncle Joe'.

EDITOR'S NOTE 2:

For the benefit of my younger readers, "Uncle Joe" was the nickname given to Joseph Stalin, the benevolent-looking General Secretary of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union's Central Committee from 1922 until his death in 1953, by the Western press. He was regarded by some at the time, as the most dangerous man in the world. His position made him the most powerful man in Russia and he was basically a dictator. The question of how many people died through Stalin's "harsh measures" may never be answered. During the late 1930s, Stalin launched the Great Purge (also known as the "Great Terror"), a campaign to purge the Communist Party of people accused of sabotage, terrorism, or treachery; he extended it to the military and other sectors of Soviet society. His victims were often executed, imprisoned in Gulag labour camps or exiled. In the years following, millions of ethnic minorities were also deported.

Some historians believe that a minimum of around 10 million deaths - 6 million minimum

from famine and 4 million minimum from other causes - are attributable to his regime, with a number of recent historians suggesting a likely total of around 20 million, citing much higher victim totals from executions, gulags, deportations and other causes. Last September, the authorities in St Petersburg uncovered a mass grave of about 30,000 people executed in the 1930s by a single shot in the back of the head.

Duke and Duchess of Gloucester attend dedication of memorial to St John Ambulance

On Tuesday 15th September 2009, the nation's leading first aid organisation commemorated the many hundreds of thousands of volunteers those who have faithfully served the Order of St John over its long history. To mark the occasion, Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of Gloucester joined guests that included members and supporters, for the dedication of a memorial garden at the National Memorial Arboretum, near Lichfield, Staffordshire.

The service of dedication commemorates the commitment and selfless service of those involved with the charity, including those who have assisted during times of national emergencies. Uniformed members including Badgers, Cadets and Fellowship welcomed the Royal Party and took part in the service. Following the service the Derbyshire St John Band led a march past of St John Ambulance members, Cadets and Fellowship.

His Royal Highness, who is the Grand Prior of the Order of St John, was then invited to meet and talk with some of the many members, past and present who have travelled from across the country to the event. St John Ambulance has a long history, with the modern organisation established in the 1800's. The St John Ambulance Association was established in 1877 and was concerned with training the public in first aid while the St John Ambulance Brigade provided first aid care to the public.

Both these organisations were amalgamated in 1987 to form the charity with which most people are familiar. The garden is the only such memorial that St John Ambulance has dedicated to its members. It incorporates the Amalfi Cross which forms part of the St John Ambulance logo and uses black granite panels to

depict the badges of St John and the Priory of England and the Islands.

NEW MEMORIAL FOR THE FLEET AIR ARM

A ceremony to dedicate a new memorial to remember and celebrate the service of the many men and women who have served in the Fleet Air Arm was held on Friday 11th September 2009. Over 6,000 men and women have given their lives in the service of Naval aviation - many of whom have served at RNAS Yeovilton - over the past 100 years and it is particularly fitting that during this centenary year that their sacrifice should be honoured.

The new memorial - a sculptured plinth of Portland stone supporting a granite aircraft carrier - is set among an avenue of old English oak trees, close to the National Armed Forces Memorial and has been designed to enable squadrons, ships and associations to place plaques or wreaths around the base of the aircraft carrier allowing the memorial to become the "spiritual property" of everyone who has served in the Fleet Air Arm.

Chief of Staff Aviation and Carriers, Rear Admiral Simon Charlier, speaking in the third issue of the special Centenary News magazine celebrating 100 Years of Naval Aviation, said: "We are very grateful to the Fleet Air Arm Associations for their considerable contribution in raising the funds to commission this project.

The design of an aircraft carrier is not only testament to the enduring importance of carrier aviation, which in a relatively short space of history has had such a significant impact, but it holds memories of loved ones for so many people throughout the country." The service included an unveiling ceremony, a flypast and the Band of the Royal Marines Beating Retreat.

RAFA Remembrance Garden

On 28th September 2009, the first national remembrance garden in memory of all those who have served in the RAF and Commonwealth air forces was opened by HRH The Princess Royal at the National Memorial Arboretum. The RAF Association Remembrance Garden is the first major RAF memorial on the site in Alrewas, Staffordshire. About 1,000 current and former RAF personnel and their families joined HRH The Princess Royal at the opening and dedication of the garden. The guests included families of RAF servicemen who have been killed while on recent

operations in Iraq. They were joined by Defence and Air Attachés representing countries that have fought alongside the UK. Kevan Jones MP, Minister for Veterans, also attended.

A service of dedication was conducted by Air Vice Marshal Peter Mills, the RAF's Chaplain in Chief. At the end of the service, a wreath was given to HRH The Princess Royal to lay at the memorial by Elizabeth Williams, 8, the daughter of Flight Lieutenant David Williams. Flight Lieutenant Williams was killed in March 2003 when an RAF GR4 Tornado aircraft from RAF Marham returning from an operational mission was engaged near the Kuwaiti border by a Patriot missile battery. After the Last Post was sounded, a Spitfire from the Battle of Britain Memorial Flight flew overhead. The inspiration for the remembrance garden came from the RAF Association's Dedication - the end line of which is 'we will remember them'. It is an opportunity for anyone who has an interest in the RAF to celebrate and remember departed loved ones. The garden will preserve the memory of serving and ex-serving members of the RAF for many years to come. At the centre of the garden is a three metre tall monument depicting the RAF Association emblem - a magnificent stainless steel eagle sitting on top of the world. The eagle is made up of over 1000 hand-forged feathers and is surrounded by a segmented RAF roundel separated into four quarters to depict the RAF Association at the heart of RAF welfare.

The RAF Association provides friendship, help and support for any members of the RAF past and present and their families. It is also the largest single-service membership organisation in the United Kingdom, with around 74,000 members and almost 500 branches.

He returned to Catterick a week later for further training before returning to 5 LAA Wg in Jan 55. He served briefly on 2 LAA Wg until Oct 55 before being posted to HQ 205 Gp on 22 Jan 56.

He then moved back to 2 LAA Wg and served on 2 (Fd) Sqn RAF Regt from 14 Mar - 16 Jun 56, when he was promoted to Substantive Sgt, and he then moved to 3 LAA Wg RAF Regt at RAF Akrotiri. A detachment to RAF El Adem in
